

I have a Service Dog. I can...



- Bring my dog (or miniature horse) into businesses with me.
- Only be asked two questions by businesses:
 - 1) Is the animal required because of your disability? and
 - 2) What task does it perform?
- Not be asked intrusive questions:
 - a) about my disability, or
 - b) asked to prove how my service dog helps me, or
 - c) asked to provide documentation about my service dog.
- Decide whether or not I want my service dog to wear a vest.
- Enter a business without my service dog if my dog has been asked to leave because it is out of control or not housebroken.
- Bring my service dog inside any business, unless it is a fundamental alteration to allow my dog inside. I understand this is rare and would occur in places such as an operating room.
- **Go into restaurants or other places that serve food with my animal,** but I may not allow my animal to sit on the table or eat out of the buffet.
- Allow my dog to be off leash, if the leash interferes with the job my dog is trained to do, as long as I maintain control over the animal in another manner, such as by voice control.
- Choose to have a pit bull or other banned breed as my service dog, even if a city has banned that specific breed as pets.
- Not be charged extra fees because I am accompanied by my service dog.
- Train my own service dog and bring my service dog in training into any business.
- **File a complaint** with the Colorado Civil Rights, the U.S. Department of Justice, or I can file a lawsuit in state or federal court if I believe my rights have been violated.
