Disability Law Colorado

- Protects and promotes the rights of people with disabilities:
- Legal Representation
- Advocacy
- Investigation
- Education

Election Laws that Protect People with Disabilities

Voting Rights Act 1965

- Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act 1984
- Americans with Disabilities Act 1990
- National Voter Registration Act 1993
- Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") 2002
- Colorado's Election Law 2013 Title 1 C.R.S.

Voting Rights Act 1965

- Governs federal election procedures
- Requires that any standard or test for determining whether someone is qualified to vote is applied to all voters equally
- Guarantees the right of a person with a disability to have voting assistance from a person of their own choosing

Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and [Disability] Act 1984

Enacted to make elections accessible to individuals with disabilities and people who are over 64

Requires polling places to be physically accessible, if no accessible location is available, then voter can vote by absentee ballot without having to provide photo ID Americans with Disabilities Act 1990 ("ADA")

- Title II of the ADA requires that all public entities make "reasonable modifications to rules, policies, or practices" to ensure nondiscrimination in state and local government programs, services and activities.
- The ADA applies to both state and federal elections

National Voter Registration Act 1993

Requires states to designate certain agencies to assist with the registration of voters, including, "all offices in the state that provide state-funded programs primarily engaged in providing services to persons with disabilities."

Addresses concerns of underrepresentation

Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") 2002

- Passed in 2002 in response to the 2000 Presidential Election
- Established the Protection and Advocacy for Voter Access Programs ("PAVA")
- Addresses barriers that voters with disabilities face in elections:
 - Physical inaccessible polling places and voting equipment
 - Discriminatory Policies ensuring independent and private voting experience

Colorado's Elections Law Title I

- Each voting and service polling center ("VSPC") must have an accessible voting machine
- All VSPC's must be physically accessible under ADA standards
- Registration forms, ballots, and other materials must be made available in alternate formats that are accessible

Colorado's Election Law cont.

- ALL registered voters receive a mail ballot at least 8 days prior to the election
- People with felonies are allowed to vote as long as the time for the felony has been served and the person has completed parole

Colorado's Election Law cont.

- You have the right to vote even if you have a guardian
- You can register to vote up until election day as long as you have been a resident of Colorado for 22 days prior to the election
- Residency is a physical address that you consider your "home base"

Registration

- Register online must have state photo ID or Colorado Driver's license at Govotecolorado.com
 - Change registration information online including address (must have driver's license or state I.D.)

Registration cont.

- Department of Motor Vehicles
- A state agency that provides public assistance
- VSPC
- PDF Form Printed from govotecolorado.com - mail, fax or email form to clerk
- Voter Registration Drive

Voting Identification

 Colorado Driver's License
 ID card issued by the Department of Revenue

U.S. Passport

Employee ID card with photo issued by U.S. government, state, municipality or other political subdivision of the state

Voting Identification cont.

- Pilot's license (no photo)
- U.S. Military Card with photo
- Current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document with name and address of elector
- Medicaid or Medicare card

Voting Identification cont.

- U.S. Birth Certificate
- Documentation of Naturalization
- Student ID with photo
- ID from Tribal Government
- Verification that a voter is a person committed to the department of human services and confined and eligible to register

Voting Accessible Elections

People with disabilities are entitled to vote independently and privately ("HAVA")

Every polling center must have at least one accessible voting machine under HAVA

Voting Accessible Elections

Accessible Voting Equipment

Marking the ballot independently

Verifying the marked ballot independently

Casting an official marked ballot independently
